

One of the many lessons you will learn about in the Red Cross pet class is what to do in the event of a snake bite. First and foremost, you should familiarize yourself with the snakes in your area. For CT, go to

http://www.ct.gov/deep/cwp/view.asp?a=2723&q=325782; it is a comprehensive guide to our snakes. Then, take the proper steps to avoid any run-ins with snakes. On-leash dogs walking on well-marked trails have less of a likelihood of meeting a snake. If your dog is bitten by a venomous snake, find the puncture wounds, keep the dog lying down and calm, and rush to the nearest vet. Tourniquets and sucking out the venom are not recommended, because if done incorrectly, they could inflict more harm and waste precious time. Never attempt to pick up the snake, even if you think it might be dead. You too, could be bitten. If you kill the snake, know that some are on the endangered species list, and that could get you a fine. Even if your dog has been bitten by a non-venomous species, it is still recommended that you note the type of snake and take your dog to the vet. The bite wound might get infected and require antibiotics.
