

Did you know that November is "Adopt a Senior Pet" month? If you are thinking about opening your home to a dog or cat, please consider adopting a senior pet. Senior pets have less chance of becoming adopted, but there are so many good reasons to adopt one. They are usually calmer, house-trained, and totally grateful!

### The Importance of Regularly Grooming Your Dog

Regularly grooming your dog is a good habit to have. No matter if your dog has short hair or long fur, it is good to brush at least weekly. Brushing not only removes dirt and dead hair, but also makes their coats shiny. Make sure that before you brush, you run your hands over your pet. This way you can find any ticks or lumps.

How often should you be bathing your dog? That will depend on your dog. You can bathe, on an as-needed basis. Some dogs need weekly baths, while others may need much less. It is good to start grooming and bathing while your pup is still young, so they become used to a routine. Use a gentle dog shampoo, warm water, and dry your pooch thoroughly, especially in colder weather. You should also get in the habit of brushing your dog's teeth daily. If you can't brush daily, as often as possible is better than not at all. Check their ears as well, they should be clean and have no odor. Nail clipping is a must for all dogs so their nails don't curl into their toe pads. If you are not up to the task of grooming, use a professional. Do your research and ask friends where they get their dogs groomed, and don't be afraid to check the facility first.

## Tips for Turkey Day





Are you having a crowd for Thanksgiving? Here are a few tips to keep your dog safe and happy on the big day.

A large number of guests can stress out your pets. Try giving you dog a long walk before guests arrive. If your dogs are crate-trained, put them in when guests are arriving and departing, so they don't slip out. Also, if you have young children coming, make sure they are never left unattended with your dog.

We may over-indulge with Thanksgiving dinner, but it is not recommended for your dog. A piece or two of skinless turkey should be sufficient. Too many fatty foods can cause upset stomach, diarrhea, or even pancreatitis. Onions, alcohol, chocolate, and certain herbs are just few foods that are toxic to dogs. Turkey bones splinter and can cause serious damage. Do not feed raw turkey unless your pup is already on a raw diet. You can treat your dog to a dollop of pure sweet potato or pumpkin. Keep your dog occupied with treat balls, special bones, or toys, so you can enjoy your dinner with no begging faces. If you cannot clean dishes right away, make certain they are out of your dog's reach.

When the guests are gone, treat your dog to some oneon-one time and an extra hug for being so wellbehaved!

## **Sweet Potato Dog Treats**

1 sweet potato, cooked and mashed 3/4-1 C whole wheat or gluten-free flour 1/4 C rolled oats 1 Tbsp. honey or pure maple syrup

1 large egg, beaten

Mix all ingredients until combined. Roll out dough on a lightly floured surface, about ½" thick. Use festive cookie cutters. Bake in a 350 degree oven, 25-30 minutes until edges are golden.
