My Dog is Lost, Help!


Part of pet ownership is keeping your fur kids safe. You can start early with having them microchipped(you must follow through and fill out and send in the information for it to be effective) and wearing ID with a current phone number. Sometimes, dogs escape, and they cannot find their way home. Being on the run and disoriented is scary for you and your pup. So, what can you do? There are many pet ID products that attach to the dog's collar and can be tracked by your phone. It is a good idea to call your vet and surrounding vets and put them on alert. Give them your most recent picture of your pup. Make sure the picture you use is clear and only of your dog. Next, give this information to your local animal control and your police station. Post your lost pet on your social media accounts. If your accounts are private, make your post public so it can be shared. Always include a picture, any pertinent medical or behavioral information, the location where your pet was lost, and all the ways you can be reached. The more you share this information, the more chances for your dog to be found and reunited with you. You can also use sites such as www.lostmydoggie.com, www.pawboost.com, and www.petamberalert.com These are national services. Do not think that your dog can't travel far, they can. Losing a pet is a horrible feeling but following these steps should help get the word out so they can quickly be returned home.
